N.Z. Notes and Comment.

4d Georg El Plats 38.

The relative scarcity of this plate has always been rather puzzling since it could be expected to give as good service as any other and this has caused me to make some investigation into its history.

The results are quite interesting and reveal a fact not hitherto published.

It is generally known that the three earlier plates, 17, 18 and 19 were continued in use after the change of colour from green to brown; it is also well known that when the ½d colour change was made (July 1941) the ½d Centennial was still in use and the new ½d was obtainable only in slot-machines or on application to the G.P.O. Wellington. The G.P.O. (on application) produced stamps printed from Plates 17, 10 and 19—all on horizontal mesh Esparto.

Some of the slot machine stamps, however, were on vertical mesh paper in 1941,42 and these has can now be deduced) must have been from Plate 38. The interesting paint is that officially, Plate 38 was not issued until 1947. I talked the matter over with Mr. Campbell Watts at the Stamps Branch, Wellington during my recent visit there and he explained why Plate 38 is officially stated to have appeared in 1947—so I am not exposing an error, just calling attention to an interesting little fact. It is almost certain that no collector had a Plate Block of 38 prior to 1947 but it should be possible to find used 2d stamps from this plate dated during 1941—1946 and recognizable by the vertical mesh.

Geo Vl Varieties.

I have received quite a few requests from collectors that I do something to straighten out the confusion which apparently exists in this issue. These collectors are anxious to specialize but lack full information as to what varieties exist. Now the issue will, I know, be dealt with most thoroughly in the forthcoming Handbook to be published by the Royal Philatelic Society but not everyone will be getting this and so I will do my best. I will deal with each denomination in turn, as fully as possible in the space available, but naturally I cannot be really exhaustive and will in effect be giving just a bare outline of such varieties and shade and paper variations as are known to me.

So that the information can be filed, this series of notes on the George VI will be confined to the Newsletter proper and will not appear in the Supplements.

While on job, and in similar manner, I will deal with the 1935 Pictorials. I think that this is really necessary because of the obvious difficulty so many collectors have with the Pictorials. My first five years of dealing coincided with the currency of the Pictorials in their most interesting phase and I must in my time nave sifted through scores of thousands of them. This practical work rather than any special ability, which I do not claim to have, taught me lots of little angles and short cuts in the sorting and easy recognising of the many varieties. I will call the series "Sight-sorting the 1935-47 Pictorials", for that is what it will amount to. Properly mastered—it is not difficult—I maintain that any collector with normal eyesight can identify at sight any 1935 Pictorial without recourse to either perforation gauge or watermark detector, (save in the case of inverted watermarks). That has been my experience and it has made the Pictorials a happy and profitable hunting ground for me. The most ardent collector knows less than half of the joys of the hobby if he does not really know his stamps—I hope to help him to that knowledge. "Sight-sorting" will also be confined to the "Newsletter".

It has not been possible to get the "Nichol" material ready for this Supplement but it will appear in Newsletter No.5.
