## Healths.

"missing dot" continues to catch the public eye and indeed I do not think there peen such a rush for a variety since the 22d Wakitipu. Excepting perhaps the 3d e "Tail". What happened with both of these—a glut—will undoubtedly happen again, le arithmetic will show that there were probably 46,666 of the "no dot" stamps ted and present indications are that most of them will have been saved. Another ety widely publicised is the "bandaged finger" (12d Row 4 No.1), but one not so known is the "wristlet watch" (12d Row 6 No.0). These are both small white marks. Ope no one will think that I suggest that they are important.

the origin of the "no dot" is puzzling, but an interesting conjecture can be made. tow the figure "l" can be seen a slight dark flaw in the blue--it looks under a glass if a white mark might have been retouched out. This would be a simple procedure in this type of printing the coloured parts of the stamp correspond with essions in the plate--just as in line-engraving. Is it, I wonder, too imaginative uppose that the printer while on this small job noticed the white dot below the and with an excess of zeal touched that out too?. Again under a glass, the place the dot should be looks rather as if retouching had been done. My theory is gthened by the fact that I am able to point to a similar thing in another N.Z. I feel sure that this, as described below, is a case of over-zealous retouching.

### 3d Maori Girl.

he original re-entries known in the 1935 Pictorials are not many nor very minent so that it is rather strange that that is one of the best of them should have en neglected and is, I think, not generally known. It takes the form of a complete abling of the Maori figurehead (if that is what it is) which forms the top left orner of the 3d stamp. The ornamentation which fills the top left corner of the entral area is also partly double.
